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## **President's Letter**

#### **Sharing the Past with the Future**

During the summer months OBHS has had the opportunity to share the rich history of Ormond Beach with children and youth in the area.

A van from Halifax Behavior Center picked me up at the Casements for three days, and I customized an hour tour for each group, children and youth struggling with whatever problems they face today but eager to hear stories of a past that took them to different times and places. The "boys" and I visited the Indian Mound, the replica of the Ormond Garage, and the replica of the Watch Tower. In each case they loved being near the water and imagining what it would be like to canoe and catch fish with the Timucua Indians, or race down the beach in a speeding car, or dutifully scan the ocean waters for German submarines off the shore during WWII. I emphasized courage, hard work, and dreams dreamed and being fulfilled. In a thank you note, one really smart young man said, "I never knew about how the militia got into the watch towers just to monitor the beach for German submarines." The "girls" and I explored the fantasy world of staying at the Hotel Ormond for three months by visiting the Cupola and then walking down Orchard Lane. Tom Massfeller, proud new owner of the Nathan Cobb Cottage, opened his doors and welcomed us in. One young lady in the small confines commented, "Well I guess a flat screen TV might fit on top of the fireplace! But where would we

sleep?" It was an absolute joy to see smiles on the faces of these kids. Planting seeds from stories of the past to keep dreams alive for the future – that's important and fun too.

Next week I'll do three walking tours with children from the Casements' Enviro Camp. We'll tour Anderson-Price Memorial Building, we'll take the stroll down Orchard Lane (Tom opening his doors again), and Dan Smith will meet us at the beach to talk about beach racing. These children will often pipe right in with comments because most are from Ormond and have already had seeds planted about the city they live in.

And it doesn't end when school starts. Christine Dann leads our participation in the Volusia County ECHO program for grade school students and their parents. She has provided education for many people from the western side of the county. And springtime will bring another Teddy Bear Picnic, started two years ago by Betty Stern.

OBHS is reaching out during the hot summer months.

This project – replacing the pole and tarp cover over the boiling house with a more permanent structure – has been in the works for over a year. Thanks to donations last year from Lowell Lohman honoring his wife, Nancy, and Tom Massfeller in memory of his parents, Kurt and Margaret Massfeller, we had the funding,

Design By Daniel Johns, PE, was completed by spring, and after city reviews and approvals, construction by Greig Rabitaille's Rabbit and Sons Construction Co. was completed in early July, 2014.

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### **Ormond Garage State Historical Marker**



In the summer newsletter issue we reported that the old Ormond Garage marker at 133 East Granada Boulevard, placed there in 1966 by the Birthplace of Speed Committee, was to be refurbished by the state.

The state came through and the sign is done – This project was made possible through Michael Zimney, historic site specialist, Bureau of Historic Preservation with the Division of Historical Resources, Florida Department of State.

#### **Dance of the Diamonds**

**John Anderson**, one of Ormond's founders and a builder of the Hotel Ormond, wrote a number of articles under the name **John Halifax**, about the Ormond area that appeared in newspapers in Northeastern cities. This one, written about 1890, appeared in the Journal section of the Boston Globe. They called it "The Dance of the Diamonds."

It was on the Ormond Halifax Bridge, that late one dark evening I witnessed a wonderfully beautiful phenomenon.

I was adjourning to the Hotel Ormond, the little hotel on the bar between the Halifax and the ocean and had been over the river to the village. As I was walking back across the bridge a heavy shower arose, and in a few moments the rain was descending in torrents.

Immediately, as far as the eye could reach on either side, the river burst into myriads of fiery diamonds. It was startling and bewildering. It was merely the phosphorescence of the water, but the effect was magnificent.

Every drop that struck was like a burning meteor, and there was a drop for every square inch on either side of the bridge. As the raindrops struck the surface, the phosphorescent waters bounded back in glowing crystals.

It was truly a dance of the diamonds!

Then, as the freshening breeze fanned the river's face, the merry waters laughed in brilliant, sparkling ripples and, as the music of the winds grew louder, faster, the waves with their flaming crests joined the mad dance.

I leaned on the rail of the dark bridge and thought myself Tom O'Shanter at the dance of the witches: The piper loud and louder blew, The dancers quick and quicker flew.

Suddenly there was a great commotion in the waters beneath me, a submarine volcano seemed boiling up liquid fire; blazing arrows and serpents shot out and around, and noiseless bombs were bursting under the surface everywhere. What was it?

It was a school of fish in the phosphorescent waters. The next moment they were gone, and the shower stopped.

And in an instant all was dark. A lurid light still played about the base of the bridge pilings like the dying flame in the candle socket, and here and there over the lagoon a breaking wave cast a lonely flash like the shadowy lantern of the night-watch moving through the deserted halls after the gay company has departed.

How lonely and dark it was on the long bridge after all. I hastened to the Ormond, but I will never forget the "Dance of the Diamonds".
